## A BOY SCOUT IS RESOURCEFUL

During the aviation meet at Media on Saturday, October 21st, Douglas Wolf and Brucie Kamp were assigned to a crossing for police duty. They saw an auto accident on the next corner. They immediately went there to see if anyone was hurt. They had to stay there the rest of the afternoon directing the traffic, and of course, saw nothing of the Meet, but they were given many favorable comments by the passers by. This is real service.

### Clothes Pin Relay

Here is a game which perhaps many of you have not played:

Equipment needed—three dozen clothes pins. The players are divided into two teams and arranged in two lines facing each other (seated). A dozen and a half clothes pins are handed to the two players facing each other at one end of the line. The pins must be held in the grasp of the two hands. At the signal to start, the player holding the bundle of pins passes the bundle to the next player in the line over his head. The object of the game is to pass the bundle of clothes pins from hand to hand to the other end of the line and return. If any of the pins are spilt the individual dropping same must recover them for his bundle before passing them on to the next. The team first succeeding in passing the bundle of pins to the end of the line and back wins.

### A REAL SCOUT SHOULD BE ALSO GOOD WOODSMAN

A real Scout prides himself on being somewhat of a woodsman, but there are some who may never be more than "townies." This name is applied to city Scouts who, in their ignorance or carelessness trample down valuable hay or other crops, leave gates open or break fences so that sheep or cattle go astray, and cause endless troubles to the farmers in recapturing them.

By flag waving or rushing about yelling they are apt to frighten flocks and herds, and stampede them. Failure to observe the precautions against fire spread has caused destructive forest fires. Trees are valuable property but are hacked into or cut down. In breaking camp the rubbish is often left unburned and unburied.

This is not the way with Scouts. You should remember this and keep up the good name Scouts have among the farmers for understanding their needs and leaving his property as they found it.
