"GOOD TURNS AND THE SCOUT LAWS"

"How many of the Scout Laws refer indirectly to good turns?"

Here's another question to start a profitable and interesting discussion at any troop meeting.

"You might do a good turn to a person because of your **LOYALTY** to him."

"Just being **FRIENDLY** is sometimes a good turn."

"A person who is **COURTEOUS** is inclined to do good turns."

"**KINDNESS** to animals means doing lots of good turns for them, especially because they can't ask you to do anything for them."

"When you're **CHEERFUL** you feel more like doing good turns."

"In the **THRIFTY** law it says to be generous to worthy objects; that's usually a good turn."

"It takes **BRAVERY** to do some good turns you get a chance to do."

"A fellow who stands for **CLEAN** speech, clean sport, etc., is doing a good turn to other fellows."

There may be good turn implications in Trustworthy, Obedient, and Reverent; I quote only what I've heard. The above answers will be duplicated in almost any troop, and can be summarized in some such words as these:

"Well, Scouts, this good turn business gets more interesting every time we talk about it, doesn't it?"
