TEN POINTS ABOUT THE WOODS FOR A SCOUT

A good Scout observes the following points:

1. Obtains permission from his Scoutmaster before starting a fire.
2. Also secures permission from the land owner for such a fire.
3. Learns the requirements covering the building of fires (page 250, Boys' Handbook) and follows them.
4. Builds his fire on a rock, or bare mineral soil, wherever possible.

5. If this is not possible, clears the dry grass and leaves away from the fire for at least five feet.
6. Is absolutely sure that a fire is out, and before leaving it places two crossed sticks on it to show that it was a Scout's fire.
7. Puts out an escaped fire if he can.
8. If he cannot put it out, reports it immediately to the fire warden, and assists him in any way possible.
9. Warns other boys who are careless with fire about the dangers of forest fires.
10. Co-operates with the state and local officials in all measures which will improve the woods, especially by refraining from hacking trees and peeling bark.
